# Planning for the Future of Services

Filling Homes, Luther Home of Mercy, and Lutheran Social Services have taken on program expansion opportunities that have positively impacted our ministries. Staff and volunteers continue to monitor the needs of those in our care so we can meet those demands through our operational goals. Below is a sampling of what the future holds as we continue to fill gaps and strengthen and grow our programs.


**Phase I Building Expansion** 

At Lutheran Social Services (LSS), we began Phase I of our fundraising efforts for a 2024-25 building expansion project (7,240 additional square feet of space) for the Toledo office at Collingwood Boulevard and Bancroft Street. These expansion plans are designed to meet sustainable program demands as LSS continues to fulfill its mission of providing human services that strengthen the mental, moral, physical, social, and spiritual well-being of its clients.

For more than a century, LSS staff and volunteers have worked to bring quality, compassionate programming to area residents, evolving services to meet both existing and emergent needs. Today, these services include Behavioral Health Counseling, Substance Use Disorder Treatment, Abusive Partner Intervention Programs, Reentry Programs for those formerly incarcerated, Financial Stability Services and Housing Programs, Emergency Choice Food Pantries and the Feed Your Neighbor Network. During the past three years, more than 70,000 people have benefited from the services offered by LSS throughout a 24-county region including Northwestern Ohio and Southeastern Michigan.

As programs expand at LSS we seek to find a balance between the past while emerging with a renewed sense of mission to carry us well into the future. For that reason, we envision a space where thousands of clients are served in a more accessible and welcoming Emergency Choice Food Pantry, where the growing numbers of those attending vital educational programs have room for learning, and where mental health counselors have offices conducive to their client's comfort and healing.

With the support of our community, local and state officials, corporate partners, and congregations, our clients, staff, and volunteers will benefit from this expansion as we proudly increase our capacity to better meet the needs of our neighbors. 2023 was certainly a year of advocacy for Filling Homes, Luther Home of Mercy, and Lutheran Social Services. Members of our staff and volunteers spent countless hours sharing our message all while advocating for fair wages, program expansions and changes in regulations that allow us to better serve the needs of our clients and residents. Letter writing campaigns, meetings with a variety of elected officials, appearing before State officials in "hearings" and providing tours of our facilities

are all ways that we advocate for those we serve, for our organizational needs and strategic growth opportunities. As we look at our unique missions, we know that by advocating for each of our ministries,

these visits allow us to educate and "shine a light" on policies and funding concerns that dampen our ability to serve.

During 2023, our advocacy efforts, when joined by others in the state, have resulted in significant funding and regulatory changes benefitting individuals with developmental disabilities and promoting the health of the agencies that serve them. And for Lutheran Social Services, meetings with elected officials broadened our ability to serve and provided the opportunity to apply for significant state and local funding.

At Lutheran Social Services of Northwestern Ohio (LSS), mental health counseling programming is offered by licensed therapists in person at our offices in Fremont, Findlay, Tiffin, and Toledo, in addition to online teletherapy services which can be offered from the comfort of your own home! Under the direction of Patty Hall, LSW, MSW Director of Behavioral Health, our staff provides a safe and hopeful environment for individuals and families who are facing some of life's most complex situations.



### Filling the Need...

#### 60 Years of Women in Philanthropy

Unstoppable. Exciting. Amazing. Awesome.

These are the words the officers of the Women's

Guild of Filling Homes used to describe the volunteer work this group accomplishes each year to make a difference. Founded 60 years ago by Mrs. Steinert, a pastor's wife at Bethlehem Lutheran Church Okolona, the group is now made up of individuals from the 4-county service area of Filling Homes: Henry, Fulton, Williams, and Defiance Counties.

In their six decades of service, the Guild has evolved. As a women's organization, the members started by helping with sewing and mending projects, canning fruits and vegetables at harvest time, making pads for resident beds and wheelchairs, and helping wherever their talents were needed. Today, 161 members raise significant funds for a variety of projects.

Two \$1,000 scholarships are part of their annual fundraising efforts. The Moser Nursing Scholarship (named after Filling Homes' first CEO) assists a current high school senior interested in nursing. The Employee Scholarship is granted to an active Filling Homes employee wanting to advance their education in Health and Human Services with the intent of serving those with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The Guild also holds popular events. The Festival of Tables is one opportunity to support the women of the Guild on the last Saturday in September. The Filling Fall Fling is an annual auction in November. With funds raised from these events, the Guild members have purchased handicapped accessible vans, tables, chairs, adaptive equipment, and more!

According to Filling Homes Director of Mission Advancement Jean Cohrs, "The Women's Guild is the heart and soul of our ministries. They come together to do amazing work, and yet are very humble when it comes to 'patting their own backs.' We are so thankful for them and the work they do—we have grown as an organization thanks to their dedication and care."


### Our Shared Ministry
